REVIEW CRITERIA FOR NEW INSTITUTIONAL HEALTH SERVICES

N.C. Gen. Stat. §131E-183(a) The Agency shall review all applications utilizing the criteria outlined in this subsection and shall determine that an application is either consistent with or not in conflict with these criteria before a certificate of need for the proposed project shall be issued.

- (1) The proposed project shall be consistent with applicable policies and need determinations in the State Medical Facilities Plan, the need determination of which constitutes a determinative limitation on the provision of any health service, health service facility, health service facility beds, dialysis stations, operating rooms, or home health offices that may be approved.

C

Bio-Medical Applications of North Carolina, Inc. (BMA or “the applicant”) proposes to relocate the existing BMA of East Charlotte (BMA-EC) facility to a new location in Mecklenburg County and add six dialysis stations for a total of 32 dialysis stations at BMA-EC upon project completion.

Need Determination

Chapter 9 of the 2020 State Medical Facilities Plan (SMFP) provides a county need methodology and a facility need methodology for determining the need for new dialysis stations. According to Table 9D, page 170, the county need methodology shows there is not a county need determination for additional dialysis stations in Mecklenburg County.

However, the applicant is eligible to apply for additional dialysis stations in an existing facility pursuant to Condition 2 of the facility need methodology in the 2020 SMFP, if the utilization rate for the dialysis center, as reported in the 2020 SMFP, is at least 75 percent or 3.0 patients per station per week, as stated in Condition 2.a. The utilization rate reported for BMA-EC on page 159 of the 2020 SMFP, is 89.42 percent or 3.58 patients per station per week, based on 93 in-center dialysis patients and 26 certified dialysis stations (93 patients / 26 stations = 3.58; 3.58 / 4 = 89.42%). Therefore, the applicant exceeds the minimum utilization required in Condition 2.a. and is eligible to apply for additional stations based on the facility need methodology in Condition 2.b.

As shown in Table 9E on page 172 of the 2020 SMFP, based on the facility need methodology for dialysis stations, the potential number of stations needed at BMA-EC is eight additional stations; thus, the applicant is eligible to apply to add up to eight stations pursuant to the facility need methodology.

The applicant proposes to add no more than six new stations pursuant to facility need, which is consistent with the 2020 SMFP calculated facility need determination for eight dialysis stations; therefore, the application is consistent with the facility need determination for dialysis stations.

Policies

There are three policies in the 2020 SMFP which are applicable to this review.

Policy ESRD-2: Relocation of Dialysis Stations, on page 20 of the 2020 SMFP, states:

“Relocations of existing dialysis stations are allowed only within the host county and to contiguous counties. Certificate of need applicants proposing to relocate dialysis stations to a contiguous county shall:

- 1. Demonstrate that the facility losing dialysis stations or moving to a contiguous county is currently serving residents of that contiguous county; and*
- 2. Demonstrate that the proposal shall not result in a deficit, or increase an existing deficit in the number of dialysis stations in the county that would be losing stations as a result of the proposed project, as reflected in the most recent North Carolina State Medical Facilities Plan, and*
- 3. Demonstrate that the proposal shall not result in a surplus, or increase an existing surplus of dialysis stations in the county that would gain stations as a result of the proposed project, as reflected in the most recent North Carolina State Medical Facilities Plan.”*

Both the existing facility and the proposed location for the relocated facility are located in Mecklenburg County. Therefore, the application is consistent with Policy ESRD-2.

Policy GEN-3: Basic Principles, on pages 30-31 of the 2020 SMFP, states:

“A certificate of need applicant applying to develop or offer a new institutional health service for which there is a need determination in the North Carolina State Medical Facilities Plan shall demonstrate how the project will promote safety and quality in the delivery of health care services while promoting equitable access and maximizing healthcare value for resources expended. A certificate of need applicant shall document its plans for providing access to services for patients with limited financial resources and demonstrate the availability of capacity to provide these services. A certificate of need applicant shall also document how its projected volumes incorporate these concepts in meeting the need identified in the State Medical Facilities Plan as well as addressing the needs of all residents in the proposed service area.”

Promote Safety and Quality

The applicant describes how it believes the proposed project will promote safety and quality in Section B, pages 14-15; Section N, pages 54-56; Section O, pages 57-60; and referenced exhibits. The information provided by the applicant is reasonable and supports the determination that the applicant’s proposal will promote safety and quality.

Promote Equitable Access

The applicant describes how it believes the proposed project will promote equitable access in Section B, pages 15-16; Section C, pages 24-25; Section L, pages 49-52; Section N, pages 54-56; and referenced exhibits. The information provided by the applicant is reasonable and supports the determination that the applicant’s proposal will promote equitable access.

Maximize Healthcare Value

The applicant describes how it believes the proposed project will maximize healthcare value in Section B, page 16; Section C, pages 21-22; Section F, pages 32-34; Section K, pages 45-48; Section N, pages 54-56; and referenced exhibits. The information provided by the applicant is reasonable and supports the determination that the applicant’s proposal will maximize healthcare value.

The applicant adequately demonstrates how its proposal incorporates the concepts of quality, equitable access, and maximum value for resources expended in meeting the facility need as identified by the applicant. Therefore, the application is consistent with Policy GEN-3.

Policy GEN-4: Energy Efficiency and Sustainability for Health Service Facilities, on page 31 of the 2020 SMFP, states:

“Any person proposing a capital expenditure greater than \$2 million to develop, replace, renovate or add to a health service facility pursuant to G.S. 131E-178 shall include in its certificate of need application a written statement describing the project’s plan to assure improved energy efficiency and water conservation.

In approving a certificate of need proposing an expenditure greater than \$5 million to develop, replace, renovate or add to a health service facility pursuant to G.S. 131E-

178, Certificate of Need shall impose a condition requiring the applicant to develop and implement an Energy Efficiency and Sustainability Plan for the project that conforms to or exceeds energy efficiency and water conservation standards incorporated in the latest editions of the North Carolina State Building Codes. The plan must be consistent with the applicant's representation in the written statement as described in paragraph one of Policy GEN-4.

Any person awarded a certificate of need for a project or an exemption from review pursuant to G.S. 131E-184 is required to submit a plan for energy efficiency and water conservation that conforms to the rules, codes and standards implemented by the Construction Section of the Division of Health Service Regulation. The plan must be consistent with the applicant's representation in the written statement as described in paragraph one of Policy GEN-4. The plan shall not adversely affect patient or resident health, safety or infection control."

The proposed capital expenditure is greater than \$2 million but less than \$5 million. In Section B, page 18, the applicant provides a written statement describing the project's plan to assure improved energy efficiency and water conservation. Therefore, the application is consistent with Policy GEN-4.

Conclusion

The Agency reviewed the:

- Application
- Exhibits to the application
- Information publicly available during the review and used by the Agency

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion based on the following:

- The application is consistent with Condition 2 of the facility need methodology for dialysis stations.
- The application is consistent with Policy ESRD-2.
- The application is consistent with Policy GEN-3.
- The application is consistent with Policy GEN-4.

(2) Repealed effective July 1, 1987.

(3) The applicant shall identify the population to be served by the proposed project, and shall demonstrate the need that this population has for the services proposed, and the extent to which all residents of the area, and in particular, low income persons, racial and ethnic minorities,

women, handicapped persons, the elderly, and other underserved groups are likely to have access to the services proposed.

C

The applicant proposes to relocate BMA-EC and add six dialysis stations to BMA-EC for a total of 32 dialysis stations upon project completion.

On pages 20-21, the applicant states that BMA-EC does not currently offer home hemodialysis or peritoneal dialysis training and support and does not plan to offer any home dialysis modalities following completion of the proposed project.

Patient Origin

On page 113, the 2020 SMFP defines the service area for dialysis stations as “...*the service area is the county in which the dialysis station is located. Each county comprises a service area except for two multicounty service areas: Cherokee, Clay and Graham counties and Avery, Mitchell, and Yancey counties.*” Thus, the service area for this facility consists of Mecklenburg County. Facilities may serve residents of counties not included in their service area.

In Section C, page 20, the applicant states that on December 31, 2019, it was serving 88 Mecklenburg County patients and one patient from another state. On Form C in Section Q, the applicant projects to serve 103.7 Mecklenburg County patients by the end of the second full operating year following project completion (CY 2023). In Section C, pages 21-22, and the Form C Utilization subsection of Section Q, the applicant provides the assumptions and methodology used to project patient origin. The applicant’s assumptions are reasonable and adequately supported.

Analysis of Need

In Section C, page 22, the applicant explains why it believes the population projected to utilize the proposed services needs the proposed services. The applicant states:

“Patients with End Stage Renal Disease require dialysis treatment on a regular and consistent basis in order to maintain life. As a general rule, patients will receive three treatments per week. The NC SMFP recognizes that this patient population requires frequent and regular treatment. The need methodology for dialysis stations is focused on four patient shifts per week and recognizes that patients will generally dialyze on a Monday-Wednesday-Friday, morning or afternoon shift schedule, or on a Tuesday Thursday-Saturday, morning or afternoon shift schedule. Failure to receive dialysis care will ultimately lead to the patient’s demise.

The need that this population has for the proposed services is a function of the individual patient need for dialysis care and treatment.”

In Section C, page 21, the applicant states that the facility's existing lease is expiring at the end of 2021 and the landlord does not want to renew the lease. The applicant also states the existing location of the facility did not allow for expansion, and the new location will allow for necessary expansion.

The information is reasonable and adequately supported for the following reasons:

- According to the 2020 SMFP, as of December 31, 2018, BMA-EC was operating at a rate of 3.58 patients per station per week, or 89.42 percent of capacity.
- Even though BMA-EC's in-center patient population was lower on December 31, 2019 than in the 2020 SMFP, as of December 31, 2019, BMA-EC was operating at a rate of 3.42 patients per station per week, or 85.5 percent of capacity.
- The applicant demonstrates eligibility to add dialysis stations to its facility under Condition 2 of the facility need methodology. The discussion regarding need methodology found in Criterion (1) is incorporated herein by reference.

Projected Utilization

In Section C, page 20, the applicant states that on December 31, 2019, it was serving 88 Mecklenburg County patients and one patient from another state. On Form C in Section Q, the applicant projects to serve 103.7 Mecklenburg County patients by the end of the second full operating year following project completion (CY 2023).

In Section C, pages 21-22, and in the Form C Utilization subsection of Section Q, the applicant provides the assumptions and methodology used to project patient utilization, which are summarized below.

- The applicant begins its utilization projections with the patient census on December 31, 2019. On page 21, the applicant states that, on December 31, 2019, it was serving 88 Mecklenburg County patients and one patient from another state.
- The applicant projects growth of the Mecklenburg County patient population at an annual growth rate of 4.2 percent, which is the Mecklenburg County Five Year Average Annual Change Rate (AACR) as published in the 2020 SMFP.
- The applicant assumes the patient from another state dialyzing at BMA of East Charlotte on December 31, 2019 is a transient patient and does not include the patient in future projections.
- The project is scheduled for completion on December 31, 2021. OY1 is CY 2022. OY2 is CY 2023.

In Section C, page 22, and in the Form C Utilization subsection of Section Q, the applicant provides the calculations used to project the patient census for OY1 and OY2, as summarized in the table below.

The applicant projects to serve 99.6 patients on 32 stations, which is 3.11 patients per station per week ($99.6 \text{ patients} / 32 \text{ stations} = 3.11$), by the end of OY1 and 103.7 patients on 32 stations, which is 3.24 patients per station per week ($103.7 \text{ patients} / 32 \text{ stations} = 3.24$), by the end of OY2. This exceeds the minimum of 2.8 patients per station per week as of the end of the first operating year as required by 10A NCAC 14C .2203(b).

Projected utilization is reasonable and adequately supported for the following reasons:

- BMA-EC was operating at a rate of 3.42 patients per station per week, or 85.5 percent of capacity, as of December 31, 2019.
- The applicant projects future utilization based on historical utilization.
- The applicant projects growth in the Mecklenburg County patient population using the Five Year AACR for Mecklenburg County of 4.2 percent as published in the 2020 SMFP.
- The applicant’s projected utilization exceeds the minimum of 2.8 patients per station per week as of the end of the first operating year as required by 10A NCAC 14C .2203(b).

Access

In Section C, page 24, the applicant states:

“Each of our facilities has a patient population which includes low-income persons, racial and ethnic minorities, women, [people with disabilities], elderly, or other traditionally underserved persons.

It is corporate policy to provide all services to all patients regardless of income, racial/ethnic origin, gender, physical or mental conditions, age, ability to pay or any other factor that would classify a patient as underserved.

Fresenius related facilities in North Carolina have historically provided substantial care and services to all persons in need of dialysis services, regardless of income, racial or ethnic background, gender, [disability], age or any other grouping/category or basis for being an underserved person.”

In Section L, page 51, the applicant projects the following payor mix during the second full fiscal year of operation following completion of the project, as illustrated in the following table.

The projected payor mix is reasonable and adequately supported.

Conclusion

The Agency reviewed the:

- Application
- Exhibits to the application
- Information publicly available during the review and used by the Agency

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the following reasons:

- The applicant adequately identifies the population to be served.
- The applicant adequately explains why the population to be served needs the services proposed in this application.
- Projected utilization is reasonable and adequately supported.
- The applicant projects the extent to which all residents, including underserved groups, will have access to the proposed services (payor mix) and adequately supports its assumptions.

- (3a) In the case of a reduction or elimination of a service, including the relocation of a facility or a service, the applicant shall demonstrate that the needs of the population presently served will be met adequately by the proposed relocation or by alternative arrangements, and the effect of the reduction, elimination or relocation of the service on the ability of low income persons, racial and ethnic minorities, women, handicapped persons, and other underserved groups and the elderly to obtain needed health care.

C

The applicant proposes to relocate BMA-EC and add six dialysis stations to BMA-EC for a total of 32 dialysis stations upon project completion.

In Section C, page 21, the applicant states that the facility's existing lease is expiring at the end of 2021 and the landlord does not want to renew the lease. The applicant also states the existing location of the facility does not allow for expansion, and the new location will allow for necessary expansion. In Section D, page 28, the applicant states the new location is approximately two miles from the current location.

In Section D, page 28, the applicant explains why it believes the needs of the population presently utilizing the services to be reduced, eliminated, or relocated will be adequately met following completion of the project. On page 28, the applicant states:

“BMA proposes to relocate the entire BMA of East Charlotte dialysis facility to a new location. Stations are not being eliminated, but are being relocated.

...

The facility is being relocated to a new location approximately two miles from the current location. This relocation will not create any adverse impact to the patients of the facility. The relocation is intended to ensure continue access to care in a location which meets the needs of the patients.”

In Section D, page 29, the applicant states:

“Each of our facilities has a patient population which includes low-income persons, racial and ethnic minorities, women, handicapped persons, elderly, or other traditionally underserved persons.

It is corporate policy to provide all services to all patients regardless of income, racial/ethnic origin, gender, physical or mental conditions, age, ability to pay or any other factor that would classify a patient as underserved.

Fresenius related facilities in North Carolina have historically provided substantial care and services to all persons in need of dialysis services, regardless of income, racial or ethnic background, gender, handicap, age or any other grouping/category or basis for being an underserved person. Low income and medically underinsured persons will continue to have access to all services provided by BMA.

This relocation will not have any impact on the patients dialyzing at the facility, or any of the above listed groups. BMA has no option but to relocate the facility. Patients currently utilizing the facility and new patients will continue to have the same access to care.”

Conclusion

The Agency reviewed the:

- Application
- Exhibits to the application

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the following reasons:

- The applicant adequately demonstrates that the needs of the population currently using the services to be reduced, eliminated, or relocated will be adequately met following project completion.
 - The applicant adequately demonstrates that the project will not adversely impact the ability of underserved groups to access these services following project completion.
- (4) Where alternative methods of meeting the needs for the proposed project exist, the applicant shall demonstrate that the least costly or most effective alternative has been proposed.

CA

The applicant proposes to relocate BMA-EC and add six dialysis stations to BMA-EC for a total of 32 dialysis stations upon project completion.

In Section E, page 31, the applicant describes the alternatives it considered and explains why each alternative is either more costly or less effective than the alternative proposed in this application to meet the need. The alternatives considered were:

- Apply for Fewer than Six Stations: the applicant states applying for fewer than six stations would not be responsive to the current patient census and projected growth of the patient census; therefore, this is not an effective alternative.
- Apply for More than Six Stations: the applicant states adding more than six stations would require development of additional square footage and would increase the capital expenditure; therefore, this is not an effective alternative.

On page 31, the applicant states its proposal is the most effective alternative because the facility relocation is necessary and the addition of six stations is responsive to the patient census.

The applicant adequately demonstrates that the alternative proposed in this application is the most effective alternative to meet the need for the following reasons:

- The application is conforming to all statutory and regulatory review criteria.
- The applicant provides credible information to explain why it believes the proposed project is the most effective alternative.

Conclusion

The Agency reviewed the:

- Application
- Exhibits to the application
- Information publicly available during the review and used by the Agency

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the reasons stated above. Therefore, the application is approved subject to the following conditions:

- 1. Bio-Medical Applications of North Carolina, Inc. shall materially comply with all representations made in the certificate of need application.**
 - 2. Pursuant to Policy ESRD-2 and the facility need determination in the 2020 State Medical Facilities Plan, Bio-Medical Applications of North Carolina, Inc. shall relocate BMA of East Charlotte and develop no more than six additional dialysis stations at the new location for BMA of East Charlotte for a total of no more than 32 certified stations at BMA of East Charlotte upon project completion.**
 - 3. Bio-Medical Applications of North Carolina, Inc. shall install plumbing and electrical wiring through the walls for no more than 32 in-center stations.**
 - 4. Bio-Medical Applications of North Carolina, Inc. shall acknowledge acceptance of and agree to comply with all conditions stated herein to the Agency in writing prior to issuance of the certificate of need.**
- (5) Financial and operational projections for the project shall demonstrate the availability of funds for capital and operating needs as well as the immediate and long-term financial feasibility of the proposal, based upon reasonable projections of the costs of and charges for providing health services by the person proposing the service.

C

The applicant proposes to relocate BMA-EC and add six dialysis stations to BMA-EC for a total of 32 dialysis stations upon project completion.

Capital and Working Capital Costs

On Form F.1a in Section Q, the applicant projects the total capital cost of the project, as shown in the table below.

In Section Q, the applicant provides the assumptions used to project the capital cost.

In Section F, page 33, the applicant states that there are no projected working capital costs because it is a relocation of an existing operational facility.

Availability of Financing

In Section F, pages 32-33, the applicant states the capital costs for the proposed project will be financed through accumulated reserves. Exhibit F-2 contains a letter from the Senior Vice President and Treasurer of Fresenius Medical Care Holdings, Inc., the applicant's parent company, authorizing the use of accumulated reserves for the capital needs of the project.

The letter in Exhibit F-2 further states:

“This project is to be funded through Fresenius Medical Care Holdings, Inc., accumulated reserves. Our 2018 Consolidated Balance Sheet (accounting for 2019 has not yet been completed) reflects more than \$1.8 billion in cash, and total assets exceeding \$20 billion.”

Financial Feasibility

The applicant provides pro forma financial statements for the first two full fiscal years of operation following completion of the project. On Form F.2 in Section Q, the applicant projects that revenues will exceed operating expenses in the first two full fiscal years following completion of the project, as shown in the table below.

The assumptions used by the applicant in preparation of the pro forma financial statements are reasonable, including projected utilization, costs, and charges. See Section Q of the application for the assumptions used regarding costs and charges. The discussion regarding projected utilization found in Criterion (3) is incorporated herein by reference.

Conclusion

The Agency reviewed the:

- Application
- Exhibits to the application

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the following reasons:

- The applicant adequately demonstrates that the capital costs are based on reasonable and adequately supported assumptions.
 - The applicant adequately demonstrates availability of sufficient funds for the capital needs of the proposal.
 - The applicant adequately demonstrates sufficient funds for the operating needs of the proposal and that the financial feasibility of the proposal is based upon reasonable projections of costs and charges.
- (6) The applicant shall demonstrate that the proposed project will not result in unnecessary duplication of existing or approved health service capabilities or facilities.

C

The applicant proposes to relocate BMA-EC and add six dialysis stations to BMA-EC for a total of 32 dialysis stations upon project completion.

On page 113, the 2020 SMFP defines the service area for dialysis stations as “...the service area is the county in which the dialysis station is located. Each county comprises a service area except for two multicounty service areas: Cherokee, Clay and Graham counties and

Avery, Mitchell, and Yancey counties.” Thus, the service area for this facility consists of Mecklenburg County. Facilities may serve residents of counties not included in their service area.

There are 27 existing and approved facilities which provide dialysis and/or dialysis home training and support in Mecklenburg County, 23 of which are operational. Information on all 27 of these dialysis facilities is provided in the table below.

- There is a facility need determination, as calculated using the methodology in the 2020 SMFP, for the proposed dialysis stations.
- The applicant adequately demonstrates that the proposed dialysis stations are needed in addition to the existing and approved dialysis stations.

On pages 47-48, the applicant identifies the proposed site and provides information about the current owner, zoning and special use permits for the site, and the availability of water, sewer and waste disposal, and power at the site. The applicant provides supporting documentation in Exhibit K-4.

As shown in the table above, during the second full fiscal year of operation, the applicant projects that 1.69 percent of services will be provided to self-pay patients; 81.53 percent to patients who will have some or all of their care paid for by Medicare (includes Medicare/commercial); and 8.20 percent to Medicaid patients.

On page 51, the applicant provides the assumptions and methodology it uses to project payor mix during the second full fiscal year of operation following completion of the project. The projected payor mix is reasonable and adequately supported because it is based on the historical payor mix.

The applicant proposes to relocate BMA-EC and add six dialysis stations to BMA-EC for a total of 32 dialysis stations upon project completion.

On page 113, the 2020 SMFP defines the service area for dialysis stations as “...*the service area is the county in which the dialysis station is located. Each county comprises a service area except for two multicounty service areas: Cherokee, Clay and Graham counties and Avery, Mitchell, and Yancey counties.*” Thus, the service area for this facility consists of Mecklenburg County. Facilities may serve residents of counties not included in their service area.

There are 27 existing and approved facilities which provide dialysis and/or dialysis home training and support in Mecklenburg County, 23 of which are operational. Information on all 27 of these dialysis facilities is shown in the table below.

Regarding the expected effects of the proposal on competition in the service area, in Section N, page 54, the applicant states:

“The applicant does not expect this proposal to have any effect on the competitive climate in Mecklenburg County. The applicant does not project to serve dialysis patients currently being served by another provider. The projected patient population for the BMA of East Charlotte facility begins with the current patient population and projects growth of that population consistent with the Mecklenburg County Five Year Average Annual Change Rate published in the 2020 SMFP.”

Regarding the impact of the proposal on cost effectiveness, in Section N, page 55, the applicant states:

“This is a proposal to relocate and expand the BMA of East Charlotte facility within Mecklenburg County. The applicant is serving a significant number of dialysis patients residing in the area of the facility. Approval of this application will allow the BMA of East Charlotte facility to continue serving patients who reside in the area. Consequently, these patients will have a shorter commute to and from dialysis treatment. This is an immediate and significantly positive impact to the patients of the area.”

Regarding the impact of the proposal on quality, in Section N, page 55, the applicant states:

“Quality of care is always in the forefront at Fresenius related facilities. Quality care is not negotiable. Fresenius Medical Care, parent organization for this facility, expects every facility to provide high quality care to every patient at every treatment.”

Regarding the impact of the proposal on access by medically underserved groups, in Section N, page 55, the applicant states:

“All Fresenius related facilities in North Carolina have a history of providing dialysis services to the underserved populations of North Carolina. Each of those facilities has a patient population which includes low-income persons, racial and ethnic minorities, women, [people with disabilities], elderly, or other traditionally underserved persons.

It is corporate policy to provide all services to all patients regardless of income, racial/ethnic origin, gender, physical or mental conditions, age, ability to pay or any other factor that would classify a patient as underserved.

Fresenius related facilities in North Carolina have historically provided substantial care and services to all persons in need of dialysis services, regardless of income, racial or ethnic background, gender, [disability], age or any other grouping/category or basis for being an underserved person. Low income and medically underinsured persons will continue to have access to all services provided by Fresenius related facilities.”

Considering all the information in the application, the applicant adequately describes the expected effects of the proposed services on competition in the service area and adequately demonstrates the proposal would have a positive impact on:

- Cost-effectiveness (see Sections C, F, K, N, and Q of the application and any exhibits)
- Quality (see Sections C, N, and O of the application and any exhibits)

- Access to medically underserved groups (see Sections C, D, L, and N of the application and any exhibits)

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the reasons stated above.

On Form A in Section Q, the applicant identifies the kidney disease treatment centers located in North Carolina owned, operated, or managed by the applicant or a related entity. The applicant identifies a total of 125 existing or approved kidney disease treatment facilities located in North Carolina.

In Section O, page 60, the applicant states that, during the 18 months immediately preceding the submittal of the application, there were no incidents related to quality of care resulting in an immediate jeopardy violation that occurred in any of these facilities. After reviewing and considering information provided by the applicant and publicly available data and considering the quality of care provided at all 125 facilities, the applicant provides sufficient evidence that quality care has been provided in the past. Therefore, the application is conforming to this criterion.

- (b) The Department is authorized to adopt rules for the review of particular types of applications that will be used in addition to those criteria outlined in subsection (a) of this section and may vary according to the purpose for which a particular review is being conducted or the type of health service reviewed.
