 The goal of palliative care is to prevent and relieve suffering and to improve quality of life for people facing serious, complex illness





Hospice Or Non-Hospice Palliative Care?

 Palliative care is different from hospice care, so those services should not be used interchangeably.



Palliative Care Is More Than Pain Control

 When a patient exhibits a physiological symptom such as pain, there are often psychological, social, and/or spiritual symptoms as well.


Elisabeth Kübler-Ross Five Stages of Grief

Listening skills and communication skills are of the utmost importance right now as a home care aide. Patients may not be able to verbalize their pain or discomfort. Therefore, the home care aide should watch for changes in behavior and report findings to the nurse supervisor. This goes for all patients, not just those receiving palliative care.
