You have a resident that is recovering from a respiratory illness. As the nurse aide, you anticipate the need for rest periods during ambulation and recognize that the resident may walk less distance than normal.

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When providing a bed bath, the nurse aide exposes one body part at a time.

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Prior to getting a resident OOB, the nurse aide always ensures the bed is locked.

You are changing a resident's linens and need to raise the bed to waist height.

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You need to turn Mrs.
Smith on her side. You understand that repositioning her every 2 hours is important in preventing skin breakdown.

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THREADS OF CARE

The resident's care plan calls for the resident to wear knee- high antiembolism stockings. As a nurse aide, you check the stockings to ensure they belong to the right resident.

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Your resident has an infection and you must put on gloves, gown and mask to provide care and remove them properly after completing care.

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THREADS OF CARE

The nurse aide has been directed by the nurse to apply a vest restraint to a resident. The nurse aide understands that prior to applying the restraint, there must be a doctor's order to do so and that the nurse aide must be taught to apply and secure prior to applying the restraint.

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You are about to give Mrs. Smith a bath and you check the water temperature.

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Prior to getting Mrs.
Jones dressed, you give her a choice of clothing.

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You are the nurse aide for Mrs. Jones and you provide perineal care during her bed bath. You use a clean area of the washcloth for each stroke during perineal care.

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You properly don and remove PPE to protect yourself and other residents.

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When helping residents who are blind, the nurse aide tells the resident where food is located using a face of an imaginary clock.

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
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When providing mouth care, only the nurse aide knows how well mouth care was performed.

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There may be consequences if certain cases of facility acquired infections can be traced back to poor hand hygiene.

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The nurse aide knows that it is illegal to record a guess or write down a value near or equal to a previous vital sign obtained by someone else when the nurse aide is unsure of the value obtained.

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When assisting a resident to the bathroom or obtaining a urine specimen, the nurse aide knows that a change of appearance in the urine should be reported to the nurse since this may signal other health problems.

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When offering a bedpan or a urinal, the nurse aide raises the bed to a comfortable working height.

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When transferring a resident from the bed to the wheelchair, the nurse aide explains what will be done, stepby-step, so the resident can help as much as possible.

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When providing catheter care, the nurse aide knows to wash the catheter in a careful manner as not to pull on the catheter.

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When assisting with dining and feeding, the nurse aide is aware of choking possibilities during feeding and is prepared to perform relief of choking.

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When assisting with dining and feeding, the nurse aide is mindful of cultural and religious considerations related to nutrition.

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The resident has the right to refuse care.

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When performing range of motion on a resident, the nurse aide stops the exercise if any joint pain occurs.

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
