REVIEW CRITERIA

(1) The proposed project shall be consistent with applicable policies and need determinations in the State Medical Facilities Plan, the need determination of which constitutes a determinative limitation on the provision of any health service, health service facility, health service facility beds, dialysis stations, operating rooms, or home health offices that may be approved.

Bio-Medical Applications of North Carolina, Inc. (hereinafter referred to as "the applicant" or "BMA"), proposes to relocate no more than seven dialysis stations from BMA Johnston Dialysis Center to Fresenius Kidney Care East Johnston (FKC East Johnston) for a total of no more than 17 stations upon project completion.

Need Determination

Chapter 9 of the 2021 State Medical Facilities Plan (SMFP) provides a county need methodology and a facility need methodology for determining the need for new dialysis stations. According to Table 9C, page 137, the county need methodology shows there is no county need determination for additional dialysis stations in Johnston County. The applicant is proposing to relocate existing dialysis stations; therefore, the facility need methodology does

not apply to this proposal. Therefore, neither of the two need determination methodologies in the 2021 SMFP apply to this proposal.

Policies

The applicant proposes to relocate dialysis stations within the same county. Therefore, there are no policies applicable to this proposal.

Conclusion

The Agency reviewed the:

- Application
- Exhibits to the application
- Information publicly available during the review and used by the Agency

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that Criterion (1) is not applicable to this review.

- (2) Repealed effective July 1, 1987.
- (3) The applicant shall identify the population to be served by the proposed project, and shall demonstrate the need that this population has for the services proposed, and the extent to which all residents of the area, and, in particular, low income persons, racial and ethnic minorities, women, ... persons [with disabilities], the elderly, and other underserved groups are likely to have access to the services proposed.

C

The applicant proposes to relocate no more than seven dialysis stations from BMA Johnston Dialysis Center to FKC East Johnston for a total of no more than 17 stations upon project completion.

FKC East Johnston does not currently serve home hemodialysis or peritoneal dialysis patients. The following table, summarized from data on page 15 of the application, shows the projected number of stations at FKC East Johnston upon project completion.

Patient Origin

On page 113, the 2021 SMFP defines the service area for dialysis stations as, "... the county in which the dialysis station is located. Each county comprises a service area except for two multicounty service areas: Cherokee, Clay and Graham counties and Avery, Mitchell, and Yancey counties." Both FKC East Johnston and BMA Johnston Dialysis Center are located in Johnston County. Thus, the service area for this application is Johnston County. Facilities may serve residents of counties not included in their service area.

In Sections C.2 and C.3, pages 23 and 24, the applicant provides the historical and projected in-center (IC) patient origin for FKC East Johnston during the last full operating year, January 1, 2020 – December 31, 2020 (CY 2020), and the projected patient origin for the second full operating year following project completion, January 1, 2024 – December 31, 2024 (CY 2024), as summarized in the following table:

In Section C.3, pages 24-26, the applicant provides the assumptions and methodology used to project its patient origin. The applicant states:

- Due to the impact of COVID-19, the applicant begins projections of the future patient population to be served with FKC East Johnston's facility census as of August 1, 2021.
- The applicant projects that the relocated stations will be certified as of December 31, 2022. Therefore, Operating Year 1 (OY1) is Calendar Year (CY) 2023, January 1-December 31, 2023 and Operating Year 2 (OY2) is Calendar Year (CY) 2024, January 1-December 31, 2024.
- The applicant projects growth of the Johnston County patient census using the Five-Year Average Annual Change Rate (AACR) of 8.8%, as published in the 2021 SMFP.

• The applicant assumes the effects of COVID-19 will ease as more people are immunized, allowing full utilization of the FKC East Johnston facility and the projected transfer of 16 IC patients from Johnston Dialysis Center.

The applicant's assumptions are reasonable and adequately supported based on the following:

- The applicant projects patient origin at FKC East Johnston based on its existing population.
- The patient origin of the patients expressing a willingness to transfer from Johnston Dialysis Center to FKC East Johnston is Johnston County and their letters state that FKC East Johnston is a more convenient location.
- The applicant increases the number of projected future patients based on the Five-Year Average Annual Change Rate (AACR) of Johnston County and the transfer of 16 IC patients from Johnston Dialysis Center, all of whom reside in Johnston County.

Analysis of Need

In Section C.4, pages 27-28, the applicant explains why it believes the population projected to utilize the proposed services needs the proposed services. The applicant states:

- BMA operates five dialysis facilities in Johnston County and the overall census in these facilities has increased by 12 patients in the first seven months of 2021, which is a growth rate of 3.76% over seven months and an annualized growth rate of 6.45%.
- Patients have signed letters of support indicating their desire to transfer to FKC East Johnston for dialysis treatment upon project completion.
- The patient population requires frequent treatments. Patients typically receive three treatments per week and either dialyze on a Monday/Wednesday/Friday morning or afternoon or Tuesday/Thursday/Saturday morning or afternoon. If patients do not receive sufficient treatments, it will lead to the patients' demise.
- The applicant projects a utilization rate of 70.72%, or 2.83 patients per station as of the end of the first operating year of the project, which exceeds the minimum required by the performance standard.

The information is reasonable and adequately supported based on the following:

- The applicant begins the projections with the existing FKC East Johnston patient census as of August 1, 2021.
- The applicant projects 16 patients will transfer their care from BMA Johnston Dialysis Center and provides letters of support from 16 patients expressing their willingness to consider a transfer to FKC East Johnston. See Exhibit C-3.
- The applicant uses the 2021 SMFP Johnston County Five-Year AACR to project a utilization rate of 70.75%, or 2.83 patients per station as of the end of the first operating year.
- The utilization rate by the end of OY1 is above the minimum standard of 2.8 patients per station per week.

Projected Utilization

In Section C.3, pages 25-26 and Section Q, page 82, the applicant provides projected utilization, as illustrated in the following table.

At the end of OY1 (CY2023) FKC East Johnston is projected to serve 48.1 in-center patients on 17 stations; and at the end of OY2 (CY2024) the facility is projected to serve 52.3 in-center patients on 17 stations.

The projected utilization rates for the first two operating years are as follows:

- OY1: 2.83 patients per station per week, or 70.75% utilization [48.1 patients / 17 stations = 2.83 / 4 = 0.7075].
- OY2: 3.08 patients per station per week, or 76.91% utilization [52.3 patients / 17 stations = 3.08/4 = 0.7691].

The projected utilization of 2.83 patients per station per week at the end of OY1 exceeds the minimum standard of 2.8 in-center patients per station per week required by 10A NCAC 14C .2203(b).

In Section Q, Form C, the applicant provides the assumptions and methodology used to project utilization, which is summarized below.

 The applicant states that when FKC East Johnston was certified for operation in September 2020 it was identified as a facility dedicated to providing dialysis treatment for COVID-19 patients. As the COVID-19 pandemic has become more manageable, the

FKC East Johnston patient population has increased from 14 patients at opening in September 2020 to 25 patients as of August 1, 2021.

- The applicant assumes that with the COVID-19 pandemic becoming more manageable, the patient population at FKC East Johnston will continue to increase.
- The applicant projects that 16 in-center patients from Johnston Dialysis Center will transfer their care to FKC East Johnston and provides letters of support in Exhibit C-3.
- The applicant uses the Johnston County Five-Year AACR of 8.8%, as published in the 2021 SMFP to project patient growth.

Projected utilization is reasonable and adequately supported based on the following:

- The applicant begins projections with the existing FKC East Johnston patient census as of August 1, 2021.
- The patient origin of all patients at FKC East Johnston is Johnston County.
- The applicant projects the patient census at FKC East Johnston will increase by the Johnston County Five Year AACR of 8.8 percent, as reported in the 2021 SMFP.
- The utilization rate by the end of OY1 is above the minimum standard of 2.8 patients per station per week.

Access to Medically Underserved Groups

In Section C.6, page 30 the applicant states:

"Each of our facilities has a patient population which includes low-income persons, racial and ethnic minorities, women, handicapped persons, elderly, or other traditionally underserved persons.

• • •

It is corporate policy to provide all services to all patients regardless of income, racial/ethnic origin, gender, physical or mental conditions, age, or health insurer."

On page 30 of the application and in supplemental information requested by the Agency, the applicant provides the estimated percentage for each medically underserved group during the second operating year, as shown in the following table.

The applicant adequately describes the extent to which all residents of the service area, including underserved groups, are likely to have access to the proposed services based on the following:

- Fresenius Medical Care related facilities have a history of providing services to low-income persons, racial and ethnic minorities, women, handicapped persons, elderly, or other traditionally underserved persons.
- The applicant's estimated percentage for each underserved group is based upon FKC East Johnston's recent experience.

Conclusion

The Agency reviewed the:

- Application
- Exhibits to the application
- Information publicly available during the review and used by the Agency

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for all the reasons described above.

(3a) In the case of a reduction or elimination of a service, including the relocation of a facility or a service, the applicant shall demonstrate that the needs of the population presently served will be met adequately by the proposed relocation or by alternative arrangements, and the effect of the reduction, elimination or relocation of the service on the ability of low income persons, racial and ethnic minorities, women, ... persons [with disabilities], and other underserved groups and the elderly to obtain needed health care.

In Section D, pages 35-36, the applicant explains why it believes the needs of the population presently utilizing the services to be relocated will be adequately met following completion of the project. On page 35, the applicant states:

"BMA projects to relocate seven dialysis stations from BMA Johnston Dialysis Center. As this project is completed BMA also projects 16 in-center dialysis patients to transfer their care to the FKC East Johnston facility. BMA does not expect this relocation of stations will have any adverse effect on the patient population remaining at BMA Johnston Dialysis Center."

On page 36, the applicant provides a table which shows projected BMA Johnston Dialysis Center utilization assuming the relocation of seven stations to the FKC East Johnston facility, which is summarized below:

The applicant projects to serve 123.3 in-center patients on 26 stations as of the date the stations are projected to be relocated. Thus, the applicant projects that Johnston Dialysis Center will have a utilization rate of 118.56% or 4.74 patients per station per week (123.3 patients / 26 stations = 4.74 / 4 = 1.1856 or 118.56%).

On page 36, the applicant states:

"BMA recognizes that utilization rates exceeding 100% necessarily mean a third, or evening dialysis shift. If it were necessary, BMA would create a third dialysis shift for Johnston dialysis center. However, it will not become necessary."

The 2021 SMFP, Table 9D shows that Johnston Dialysis Center qualifies to apply for up to 20 additional stations in 2021. In 2021 the facility submitted one application (Project ID# J-12163-21) to add seven dialysis stations at Johnston Dialysis Center and the review begins

December 1, 2021. Assuming approval of the application to add seven dialysis stations back to Johnston Dialysis Center, the applicant states the utilization rate for December 31, 2022 is calculated to be 3.74 patients per station per week (123.3 patients / 33 stations = 3.74 / 4 = .9341 or 93.4%).

In Section D, pages 35-36, the applicant provides the assumptions and methodology used to project utilization, which is summarized below.

- The applicant projects that the relocated stations will be certified as of December 31, 2022.
- The applicant begins projections of the future patient population served by the Johnston Dialysis Center facility with the Johnston County patient population as of December 31, 2020.
- The applicant projects growth of the Johnston County patient census using the Johnston County AACR of 8.8%, as published in Table 9B of the 2021 SMFP.
- The applicant projects that the facility will continue to serve the two patients residing in Wilson County which is contiguous to Johnston County. The applicant assumes these patients will continue dialysis with the facility and does not project any growth for this segment of the patient population. The applicant states that these patients will be added to projections of future patient populations at the appropriate time.
- The applicant assumes the application they have submitted to add seven stations back to Johnston Dialysis Center will be approved and will provide a utilization rate of 3.74 patients per station per week as of December 31, 2022.

Projected utilization is reasonable and adequately supported based on the following:

- The applicant begins projections of the future patient population served by the Johnston Dialysis Center facility as of December 31, 2020.
- The applicant projects growth using the 2021 SMFP County Five-Year AACR for Johnston County.
- The applicant projects that the facility will continue to serve the two patients residing in Wilson County and does not project any growth for this segment of the patient population.
- The utilization rate by the end of OY1 is above the minimum standard of 2.8 patients per station per week.

Access to Medically Underserved Groups

In Section D, page 37, the applicant states:

"Each of our facilities has a patient population which includes low-income persons, racial and ethnic minorities, women, handicapped persons, elderly, or other traditionally underserved persons. It is corporate policy to provide all services to all patients regardless of income, racial/ethnic origin, gender, physical or mental conditions, age, or health insurer."

The applicant provides the estimated percentage for each medically underserved group during the second operating year, as shown in the following table.

The applicant adequately demonstrates that the needs of medically underserved groups that will continue to use dialysis services will be adequately met following completion of the project for the following reasons:

- Fresenius Medical Care related facilities have a history of providing services to low-income persons, racial and ethnic minorities, women, handicapped persons, elderly, or other traditionally underserved persons.
- The applicant's estimated percentage for each underserved group is based upon Johnston Dialysis Center's recent experience.

Conclusion

The Agency reviewed the:

- Application
- Exhibits to the application
- Information publicly available during the review and used by the Agency

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the following reasons:

- The applicant adequately demonstrates that the needs of the population currently using the services to be reduced, eliminated or relocated will be adequately met following project completion for all the reasons described above.
- The applicant adequately demonstrates that the project will not adversely impact the ability of underserved groups to access these services following project completion for all the reasons described above.
- (4) Where of meeting the needs for the proposed project exist, the applicant shall demonstrate that the least costly or most effective alternative has been proposed.

CA

The applicant proposes to relocate no more than seven dialysis stations from BMA Johnston Dialysis Center to FKC East Johnston for a total of no more than 17 stations upon project completion.

In Section E.2, page 39, the applicant describes the alternatives considered and explains why each alternative is either more costly or less effective than the alternative proposed in this application to meet the identified need. The alternatives considered were:

- Maintain the Status Quo The applicant states that maintaining the status quo is not an effective alternative because this alternative fails to recognize the growing patient population and there are a significant number of patients supporting the relocation. Therefore, the applicant determined this is not the most effective alternative.
- Relocate more than seven stations The applicant states that relocating more than seven stations would require a physical plant expansion and thus significant capital expenditure to develop additional space. Therefore, the applicant determined this is not the least costly nor most effective alternative.
- Relocate fewer than seven stations The applicant states that relocating fewer than seven stations is less effective because there is high demand for dialysis at FKC East Johnston and could result in delays of treatment due to a lack of capacity. Therefore, the applicant determined this is not the most effective alternative.

The applicant adequately demonstrates that the alternative proposed in this application is the most effective alternative to meet the need for the following reasons:

- The application is conforming to all statutory and regulatory review criteria.
- The applicant provides credible information to explain why they believe the proposed project is the most effective alternative.
- The applicant can address high utilization rates and avoid possible patient admission interruptions while avoiding the capital expense of a physical plant expansion.

Conclusion

The Agency reviewed the:

- Application
- Exhibits to the application

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the reasons stated above. Therefore, the application is approved subject to the following conditions:

1. Bio-Medical Applications of North Carolina, Inc. (hereinafter certificate holder) shall materially comply with all representations made in the certificate of need application.

- 2. The certificate holder shall relocate no more than seven in-center stations from BMA Johnston Dialysis Center to Fresenius Kidney Care East Johnston for a total of no more than 17 in-center stations upon project completion.
- 3. Upon completion of this project, the certificate holder shall take the necessary steps to decertify seven in-center stations at BMA Johnston Dialysis Center for a total of no more than 26 in-center stations at BMA Johnston Dialysis Center.

4. Progress Reports:

- a. Pursuant to G.S. 131E-189(a), the certificate holder shall submit periodic reports on the progress being made to develop the project consistent with the timetable and representations made in the application on the Progress Report form provided by the Healthcare Planning and Certificate of Need Section. The form is available online at: https://info.ncdhhs.gov/dhsr/coneed/progressreport.html.
- b. The certificate holder shall complete all sections of the Progress Report form.
- c. The certificate holder shall describe in detail all steps taken to develop the project since the last progress report and should include documentation to substantiate each step taken as available.
- d. Progress reports shall be due on the first day of every Fourth month. The first progress report shall be due on June 1, 2022. The second progress report shall be due on October 1, 2022 and so forth.
- 5. The certificate holder shall acknowledge acceptance of and agree to comply with all conditions stated herein to the Agency in writing prior to issuance of the certificate of need.
- (5) Financial and operational projections for the project shall demonstrate the availability of funds for capital and operating needs as well as the immediate and long-term financial feasibility of the proposal, based upon reasonable projections of the costs of and charges for providing health services by the person proposing the service.

The applicant proposes to relocate no more than seven dialysis stations from BMA Johnston Dialysis Center to FKC East Johnston for a total of no more than 17 stations upon project completion.

The applicant adequately demonstrates the availability of sufficient funds for the capital needs of the project based on the following:

- Exhibit F-2 contains a letter dated September 15, 2021, from Senior Vice President and Treasurer for Fresenius Medical Care Holdings, Inc., parent company to Bio-Medical Applications of North Carolina, Inc., authorizing the use of accumulated reserves for the capital needs of the project.
- The applicant documents that it has adequate cash and assets to fund the capital cost of the proposed project.

Financial Feasibility

The applicant provided pro forma financial statements for the first two full fiscal years of operation following completion of the project. In Section Q, Form F.2, the applicant projects

that revenues will exceed operating expenses in the first two full fiscal years following completion of the project, as shown in the table below.

The assumptions used by the applicant in preparation of the pro forma financial statements are provided in Section Q. The applicant adequately demonstrates that the financial feasibility of the proposal is reasonable and adequately supported based on the following:

- Contractual adjustments are calculated by payor class and modality for each year.
- Salary expenses are projected to increase at a rate of 2.0% annually.
- The employer pays 36% of the staff expense for benefits and payroll taxes.
- Projected utilization is based on reasonable and adequately supported assumptions. See the discussion regarding projected utilization in Criterion (3) which is incorporated herein by reference.

Based on that review, the Agency concludes that the application is conforming to this criterion for the following reasons:

- The applicant adequately demonstrates that the capital costs are based on reasonable and adequately supported assumptions for all the reasons described above.
- The applicant adequately demonstrates availability of sufficient funds for the capital needs of the proposal for all the reasons described above.
- The applicant adequately demonstrates sufficient funds for the operating needs of the proposal and that the financial feasibility of the proposal is based upon reasonable projections of revenues and operating expenses for all the reasons described above.
- (6) The applicant shall demonstrate that the proposed project will not result in unnecessary duplication of existing or approved health service capabilities or facilities.

The applicant proposes to relocate no more than seven dialysis stations from BMA Johnston Dialysis Center to FKC East Johnston for a total of no more than 17 stations upon project completion.

On page 113, the 2021 SMFP defines the service area for dialysis stations as "the service area is the county in which the dialysis station is located. Each county comprises a service area except for two multicounty service areas: Cherokee-Clay-Graham counties and Avery-Mitchell-Yancey counties." Both FKC East Johnston and BMA Johnston Dialysis Center are located in Johnston County. Thus, the service area for these facilities is Johnston County. Facilities may serve residents of counties not included in their service area.

According to Table 9A of the proposed 2022 SMFP and the information provided by the applicant in Section G page 47, there are six existing or approved dialysis facilities in Johnston County, five of which are owned and operated by BMA. Information on these dialysis facilities is summarized below:
