## Two in Randolph County compete for dialysis stations

**RALEIGH** – Two competing applications have been filed with the Certificate of Need Section of the N.C. Division of Health Service Regulation to add dialysis stations in Randolph County.

A public hearing for these projects will be held at 11 a.m. on May 19 at the Randolph County Historic Courthouse, Commissioners Meeting Room, second floor, 145 Worth St., Asheboro.

The January 2014 North Carolina Semiannual Dialysis Report identifies a deficit of 10 stations in Randolph County. A brief description of each proposed project follows:

- Bio-Medical Application of North Carolina, Inc. d/b/a BMA Asheboro, proposes to relocate two existing dialysis stations from BMA South Greensboro in Guilford County to BMA Asheboro. The project is expected to cost \$15,750 and be complete by Dec. 31, 2016.
- Wake Forest University Health Sciences d/b/a/ North Randolph Dialysis Center of Wake Forest University proposes to develop a new 10-station dialysis facility at 1449 E. Sunrise Ave. in Thomasville by transferring 10 existing dialysis stations from High Point Kidney Center at Wake Forest University in Guilford County to North Randolph Dialysis Center of Wake Forest University. The project is expected to cost \$3.3 million and be complete by Dec. 31, 2015.
