Two applicants compete for fixed dedicated PET scanner in Wake County

RALEIGH — Two applicants have filed competing certificate of need proposals with the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services in response to a need determination in the 2017 State Medical Facilities Plan for one fixed positron emission tomography (PET) scanner in Wake County.

A public hearing for these projects will be held Oct. 12 at 10:30 a.m. in Conference Room 104 in the Brown Building, 801 Biggs Drive on the Dorothea Dix Campus in Raleigh. The proposals are as follows:

- Duke University Health System proposes to acquire one fixed PET/CT scanner to be located at Duke Raleigh Hospital. The project is expected to cost \$7.9 million and would be complete in November 2018.
- Rex Hospital proposes to acquire one fixed PET scanner to be located at Rex Hospital. The project is expected to cost \$3.9 million and would be complete in December 2018.

Anyone may file written comments concerning these proposals. Comments must be received by the Healthcare Planning and Certificate of Need Section no later than
