	<u>Chapter 12 – Home Health Services</u> Two petitions related to Home Health Services were received. The first petition was received from Myriad Homecare Agency (MHA) requesting an adjusted need determination for one home health agency or office in Wake County to address the special needs of the Hispanic-Latino population in the 2015 SMFP. Three comments were received about this petition.		
	The second petition was from Triangle Orthopaedic Associates, PA that requests an adjusted need determination in the 2015 SMFP for one Medicare-certified home health agency or office in Wake, Durham, or Orange County, to coordinate post-acute care for orthopaedic surgery program, as part of a demonstration project. Three comments were received about this petition.		
	<u>Chapter 13 – Hospice Services</u> Three petitions related to Hospice Services were received. The first petition was received from Burke Hospice & Palliative Care requesting a need determination for three hospice inpatient beds in Burke County. One comment was received about this petition and 47 letters of support.		
	The second petition was submitted by Caldwell Hospice and Palliative Care. The petitioner requested an adjusted need determination of three hospice inpatient beds for Caldwell County be included in the 2015 SMFP. Two comments were received.		
	The third hospice service petition was submitted by Richmond County Hospice, Inc. requested a need determination for 3 hospice inpatient beds in Richmond County. Two comments were submitted regarding this petition.

Three comments were received regarding this petition, including one from the petitioner. Additionally, four comments were received about the policy. Chapter 9 – Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) One petition was received from Carolinas HealthCare System that requested the need determination for one fixed MRI Scanner in Lincoln County be removed from the Proposed 2015 SMFP. No comments were received.		
	Chapter 9 – Cardiac Catheterization Two petitions were received on this section. The first was from Rex Healthcare requesting an adjusted need determination in Wake County for one fixed cardiac catheterization machine. There were two comments received regarding this petition and 42 letters of opposition.		

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	The second petition was from WakeMed Health and Hospitals requesting no adjusted need determination for cardiac catheterization in Wake County. There was one comment received about this petition.

	Chapter 5 – Acute Care Hospital Beds One petition was received for acute care hospital beds. Cape Fear Valley Medical Center requested an adjusted need determination to decrease the need for 82 beds in Cumberland County to zero. One comment was received regarding this petition, this was from the petitioner.		
	Two additional comments were received regarding the acute care hospital bed needs in the Proposed 2015 SMFP.		
	<u>Chapter 6 – Operating Rooms</u> Two petitions were received for operating rooms. The first was received from Blue Ridge Bone and Joint. They submitted a petition requesting a demonstration project for a single specialty, two operating room, ambulatory surgical facility in Buncombe, Madison, and Yancey Counties. Three comments were received in response to this petition, one from the petitioner.		

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	The second petition was received from Wilmington Health, PLLC. This was a petition requesting a need adjustment for two operating rooms in New Hanover County. Two comments were received regarding this petition.		
	<u>Chapter 7 – Other Acute Care Services</u> No petitions or comments were received.		
	<u>Chapter 8 – Inpatient Rehabilitation Services</u> No petitions or comments were received.		
	Dr. Pete stated the committee would provide recommendations to the State Health Coordination Council in preparation for the Proposed 2015 SMFP at the October 1, 2014 meeting.
