Petition to the State Health Coordinating Council Regarding the Reallocation of Need from Perquimans County to Gates County 2012 State Medical Facilities Plan

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REQUESTED ADJUSTMENT

This petition requests an adjustment to the need determination to include an ability to reallocate adult care home beds from Perquimans County to Gates County.

As explained in more detail in the next section, a problem exists in the current need determination that leaves a significant need unmet. To address this problem, we ask that the North Carolina State Health Coordinating Council amend the draft 2012 State Medical Facilities Plan, Chapter 11 to include:

a special adjusted need determination for the 30 Adult Care Home beds currently allocated to Perquimans County to be reallocated for use in either Perquimans County or Gates County.

REASONS FOR THE PROPOSED ADJUSTMENT

Summary

In 2010, Gates and Perquimans County Boards of Commissioners came to the conclusion that, in order to provide the citizens of both counties with adequate care close to their homes, the adult care home beds allocated to both counties must be combined. The 30 beds allocated to Perquimans County were new to the State Medical

Facilities Plan as of 2011. However, the 40 beds allocated to Gates County had been in the State Medical Facilities Plan for many years, and no one had applied for them.

In early 2010, Meridian Senior Living ("Meridian"), an adult care home management company that currently manages 41 adult care homes in North Carolina, contacted the Gates County Manager, Toby Chappell, as it considered applying for the 40 beds in Gates County. It was determined, however, that a 40 bed facility in Gates County did not provide sufficient economies of scale to be a worth while venture for Meridian. But, if more beds were to be allocated to Gates County, Meridian would be very interested in pursuing the CON and building the adult care home.

Incidence of Unmet Need

The 40 beds allocated to Gates County have been in the State Medical Facilities Plan for many years. This is not a unique situation. In fact, there is a pattern to be found looking back to State Medical Facilities Plans of previous years. Seeing this evidence, the Perquimans County Commissioners logically concluded that the 30 beds in the 2011 State Medical Facilities Plan allocated to Perquimans County would probably suffer the same fate. The following chart shows that rural counties with 40 or fewer adult care home beds allocated to them rarely see their needs met through the use of these beds:

The bed reductions in both Camden County and Washington County were due to adjustments in the bed need determination; they were not awarded to applicants. It is clear, from the chart above, that, in order to meet the needs of the citizens of Perquimans and Gates Counties, the bed allocations must be combined such that an applicant will apply for the beds and build an adult care home. Otherwise, no adult care home will be built, and the needs of these people will go unmet.

This proposal would further some of the most important purposes of the CON statute by targeting this traditionally underserved population (those living in counties with small populations) with a low-cost, effective solution to a challenge to the healthcare system. N.C. Gen. Stat. §§ 131E-183(a)(3), (4), and (13).

Description of Reallocation

Meridian intends to apply for the 40 beds allocated to Gates County and the 30 beds allocated to Perquimans County, combining the beds to create one 70-bed facility in Gates County. This 70-bed facility would have the economies of scale necessary to allow adequate profit margins for the operator, while providing excellent care for the facility's residents.

Reasons for Project Location

The geographic location of the facility is an essential asset leading to the project's success. Meridian intends to locate the facility within the service are of the municipal water and sewer system of Gatesville. Gatesville is centrally located in Gates County. A location closer to the county line separating Gates and Perquimans Counties was considered. However, such a location was rejected based on the excessive costs

associated with constructing and maintaining a well and sewage treatment system large enough to provide service to the residents as well as powerful enough to provide water pressure and volume to a fire sprinkler system.

Benefits of Reallocation

As stated before in this petition, the reallocation of the Perquimans County beds to Gates County would benefit the citizens of both counties by providing an adult care home to serve both counties instead of having the beds linger in the State Medical Facilities Plan.

ADVERSE EFFECTS ON THE POPULATION IF THE ADJUSTMENT IS NOT MADE

If the requested adjustment is not made, the populations of both Perquimans and Gates Counties will continue to suffer from the lack of sufficient adult care home beds in their area. These people will be forced to continue to look to adult care homes far away from their communities for care. This situation limits family and community interaction for those displaced by the lack of beds.

ALTERNATIVES CONSIDERED AND REJECTED

Status Quo

The status quo fails to address the issues brought forth by this petition. The current system leaves a care gap between those living in more populous counties who enjoy adult care homes close by, and those living in less populous counties who must look to other counties for adult care homes. Despite adult care home beds being

allocated to these counties, the economic realities create a situation where these beds remain in the State Medical Facilities Plan, unutilized.

Constructing a Facility on the County Line

In theory, a facility could be built by which one wing of bedrooms would be in Gates County, and other wing of bedrooms would be in Perquimans County. Such a facility would straddle the county line so that the beds allocated to Gates County would be built in Gates County, and the beds allocated to Perquimans County would be built in Perquimans County. This facility would remain in compliance with the CON law as it is currently written, while taking advantage of the economies of scale enjoyed by a 70-bed facility. The problem with this alternative, however, is that there is no municipal water and sewer system on the line separating Gates and Perquimans Counties. As discussed before, a lack of municipal water and sewer system would eliminate the financial advantages of having a larger facility.

Wait for Need in a Future State Medical Facilities Plan

Waiting for need in a future State Medical Facilities Plan would be an unreasonable alternative. Neither Gates nor Perquimans County populations are growing at a significant rate. As such, it would be many years before a future State Medical Facilities Plan would allocate enough beds to either county for someone to apply for the beds as they stand now.

EVIDENCE THAT DEVELOPMENT OF PROPOSED SERVICE WOULD NOT RESULT IN UNNECESSARY DUPLICATION OF HEALTH RESOURCES IN THE AREA

For the purposes of this proposal, the service area should be considered to be both Gates and Perquimans County combined. Simply adding 30 beds to Gates County would surely produce a bed surplus when just considering the needs of Gates County. However, when considering the needs of both counties, the number of beds developed would match the bed need determination for the service area, and would not result in unnecessary duplication of health resources.

EVIDENCE THAT THE REQUESTED ADJUSTMENT IS CONSISTENT WITH THE THREE BASIC PRINCIPLES GOVERNING THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE STATE MEDICAL FACILITIES PLAN

Safety and Quality

This project will promote safety and quality in the delivery of health care services. The development of a facility that would combine the beds from Gates and Perquimans Counties allows economies of scale that would better ensure that the level of safety and quality of care are high.

Access

This project will promote equitable access. Accordingly, the project facility will accept both private pay residents and residents relying on Medicaid. Alternately, the lack of the project facility would keep the access to these services low in both counties.

Value

This project will maximize healthcare value for resources expended. The economies of scale utilized in building a facility that combines the bed needs of Gates

and Perquimans Counties allows for resources to be conserved and value to be added to the services provided to the residents of the adult care home.

CONCLUSION

The citizens of Gates County have gone a long time with an adult care home bed need that has not been met. Having only a 40 bed allocation, potential applicants for the beds have been discouraged by the high risk of taking on such a small number of beds. When Perquimans County was allocated 30 beds, the same effect was foreseen. Only a reallocation of these beds would allow the needs of the populations in both counties to be met.

RESOLUTION TO SUPPORT THE ALLOCATION OF CERTIFICATE OF NEED

Whereas, The Gates County Board of Commissioners wish to have the medical needs of the Citizens of Gates County addressed locally if at all possible; and

Whereas, The Gates County Board of Commissioners seek to bring sustainable development for the County's resident; and

Whereas, Gates County has been approached regarding the building of a adult care center that will be available to all Counties in the region; and

Whereas, Gates County is projected to have a forty adult care bed surplus in the upcoming certificate of need process; and

Whereas, Gates County has been approached by Home Life Care, owned and operated by Donna Chamblee of Ahoskie North Carolina; and

Whereas, The locating of this facility in Gates County will produce between 35 to 45 jobs in our Tier 1 County; and

Whereas, Gates County's governmental revenue is heavily dependent upon the property tax bases to which the location of this facility in Gates County will produce nearly \$20,000 annual for the property tax bases; and

Whereas, Gates County is located in an area that is adjacent to world-class health care facilities; for example Obici Hospital and Norfolk General Hospital; and

Whereas, Gates County has not been approached by another business during the current Certificate of Need (CON) cycle; and

Whereas, any and all support that the Gates County Board of Commissioners offers in predicated on the Adult Care Facility being built in Gates County;

NOW, THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED that the Gates County Board of Commissioners:

- Strongly endorse the State of North Carolina allocating any and all available adult care beds, which are currently assigned to Gates County, to N & M Properties, a company owned and operated by Donna Chamblee of Ahoskie, North Carolina.
- 2. Specifically, the Gates County Board of Commissioners encourage that any and all State of North Carolina agencies that can provide assistance in the allocation of any surplus beds, currently designated for Gates County, do so in a manner that is both expeditious and consistent with the lawful uses of same.

RESOLUTION TO SUPPORT THE TRANSFER OF CERTIFICATE OF NEED

Whereas, Gates County and Perquimans Counties are located in rural Northeastern North Carolina; and

Whereas, The ability of Counties in this region to continue to be successful is predicated upon the symbiotic relationships between Counties; and
