V 118	<p>27G .0209 (C) Medication Requirements</p> <p>10A NCAC 27G .0209 MEDICATION REQUIREMENTS (c) Medication administration: (1) Prescription or non-prescription drugs shall only be administered to a client on the written order of a person authorized by law to prescribe drugs. (2) Medications shall be self-administered by clients only when authorized in writing by the client's physician. (3) Medications, including injections, shall be administered only by licensed persons, or by unlicensed persons trained by a registered nurse, pharmacist or other legally qualified person and privileged to prepare and administer medications. (4) A Medication Administration Record (MAR) of all drugs administered to each client must be kept current. Medications administered shall be recorded immediately after administration. The findings are:</p> <p>a. Review on 8/30/22 of client #1's record revealed: -Admission date of 8/26/15. -Diagnoses of Moderate Intellectual or Developmental Disability, Psychotic Disorder, Diabetes, Gastroesophageal Reflux Disease, Allergic Rhinitis, Tobacco Dependence, Essential Hypertension, Hyperlipidemia, Leukoplakia, Constipation and Hearing Loss.</p> <p>Review on 8/30/22 of physician's orders revealed: -Order dated 6/1/22 for Blood Pressure Checks.</p> <p>Review on 8/31/22 of the July 2022 MAR for client #1 revealed: -No staff initials as checked on 7/19 thru 7/22, 7/28 and 7/29 for blood pressure.</p> <p>b. Review on 8/30/22 of client #2's record revealed: -Admission date of 10/24/13.</p>	V 118	<p><i>The employees were all informed / reminded that all MARs must have names and initials of administering medications.</i></p>	<p><i>9/1/22</i></p>

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V 118	<p>Continued From page 2</p> <p>-Diagnoses of Mild Intellectual or Developmental Disability, Epilepsy, Attention Deficit Disorder and Oppositional Defiant Disorder.</p> <p>Review on 8/30/22 of physician's orders revealed: -Order dated 9/8/21 for Folic Acid 1 milligrams (mg) (Anemia), one tablet twice daily; Sertraline 50 mg (Depression, Anxiety Disorder), one tablet daily and Alyacen 1-35-28 (Birth Control), one tablet daily.</p> <p>Review on 8/31/22 of the July 2022 MAR for client #2 revealed: -No staff initials as administered on 7/29 for Folic Acid 1 mg and Sertraline 100 mg. -No staff initials as administered on 7/23 for Alyacen 1-35-28.</p> <p>Interview on 8/31/22 with staff #1 revealed: -She wasn't sure why staff failed to document the blood pressure was checked for client #1 in July 2022. -She knew client #1 had Covid around that time and possibly refused to have her blood pressure checked because she felt bad. -Clients did get their medications as prescribed. -She thought staff forgot to sign off on client #2's July 2022 MAR to indicate the medication was given. -She confirmed staff failed to keep the MARs current for clients #1 and #2.</p> <p>Interview on 8/31/22 with the Executive Director confirmed: -Staff failed to keep the MARs current for clients #1 and #2.</p> <p>Due to the failure to accurately document medication administration it could not be determined if clients received their medications</p>	V 118	<p><i>The company inspection form was updated for staff to look for any signs of bed bugs, dead or alive, droppings, etc. She was given paperwork on the look of a bed bug to know what they are looking for. An exterminator was hired immediately when confirmed of bed bugs. The house was heat treated and a bed bug sniffing dog came two weeks afterward and the dog did not alert any bugs.</i></p>	<p><i>9/6/22</i></p>

This Rule is not met as evidenced by: Based on observations and interviews the facility staff failed to maintain an insect free environment. The findings are: Observation on 8/31/22 at approximately 8:22 am of client #2 revealed: -She had multiple reddish bite marks on both hands, arms and shoulders. Observation on 8/31/22 at approximately 8:35 am of client #5 revealed: -She had approximately eight pinkish colored bites on her right wrist. Observation on 8/31/22 at approximately 8:55 am of client #1's bedroom revealed: -The box spring cover had approximately eight bed bug fecal spots and brownish bug shells. Attempted interview on 8/31/22 with client #1 was unsuccessful because she was deaf. Interview on 8/31/22 with client #2 revealed: -She was tired of seeing bed bugs in the facility. -The bugs she saw in the facility were small and	V 738	indicated there were no bed bugs. The staff will continue to check on a regular basis and clients has been told to tell group home staff any bugs or bites are found. There is a contract with [REDACTED] Exterminator to provide prevention of bed bugs. I have attached a copy of the contract. Also, the comment of not affording heat treat the home was taken out of text. The survey asked about heating and it

She saw a bed bug on her blanket in her bedroom.</p> <p>-She last saw bed bugs in the facility yesterday. She had a bed bug on her shirt.</p> <p>Interview on 8/31/22 with client #3 revealed:</p> <p>-She heard the facility had bed bugs, however she never saw any in the facility.</p> <p>-She had a few bites on her arms. She wasn't sure how long ago.</p> <p>-She was itching and staff told her she was probably being bitten by bed bugs.</p> <p>Interview on 8/31/22 with client #4 revealed:</p> <p>-She knew the facility had bed bugs.</p> <p>-She thought she saw a bed bug last night on her bed.</p> <p>-She was never bitten by any bed bugs. She heard some of the other clients were being bitten by bed bugs.</p> <p>-She thought client #2 was being bitten by bed bugs a lot because she saw bites on her arms and legs.</p> <p>Interview on 8/31/22 with client #5 revealed:</p> <p>-She heard the other clients talking about seeing bed bugs in the facility.</p> <p>-She never saw any bed bugs in the facility.</p> <p>-At night she was being bitten by something, however she could never see anything biting her.</p> <p>-She knew it was something wrong in the facility, but she wasn't sure what it was at the time.</p> <p>Interview on 8/31/22 with staff #1 revealed:</p> <p>-She thought staff #3 brought it to her attention about the bed bugs in July 2022.</p> <p>-Staff #3 handled the situation with the bed bugs.</p> <p>-She didn't have a lot of information about the bed</p>	V 738	<p><i>Stated CCH could not afford to heat treat every month at the cost of \$ 7400.00. The group home made efforts to control the situation prior to the heating but was told by the survey, it wasn't good enough. Our efforts felt in vain. Our goal is to always keep all homes insect free w/ quarterly treatments for ants, etc.</i></p>

The powder was supposed to help with the bed bugs. <p>Interview on 8/31/22 with staff #2 revealed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -The facility had an issue with bed bugs. -She started seeing bed bugs in the facility in June 2022. -She saw bed bugs in client #1's bedroom on her comforter. -Client #1 also told her that she was itching. -Client #1 had bug bites on her arms. -The majority of the clients were bitten by the bed bugs. -She reported the issue with the bed bugs to staff #1 in June 2022. -She thought staff #1 used some type of spray and a powder to try and get rid of the bed bugs. -Staff #1 started spraying the facility and using the powder in June 2022. -She felt like the spray and powder for the bed bugs did not work. -She continued to see bed bugs in the facility and clients were still being bitten. -The house was later fogged in August 2022 on two separate occasions. <p>Interview on 8/31/22 with staff #3 revealed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -She thought the issue with bed bugs came to her attention at beginning of July 2022. -She was visiting client #1 and saw some dark streaks on her bedding. -She kept looking around the bed and saw a bed bug on the bed shirt. -She called the Executive Director about seeing the bed bug that same day. -She stripped the bed down and threw away the bedding. -She sprayed the bed with alcohol. She heard alcohol could be used to kill bed bugs. 	V 738		

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V 738	<p>Continued From page 6</p> <p>Interviews on 8/30/22 and 8/31/22 with the Executive Director revealed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -The facility had an issue with bed bugs. -She thought the issue with the bed bugs came to their attention towards end of July 2022. -Staff #3 noticed markings on the bedding for client #1. -Staff #2 also noticed client #1 had bites on her arms. -She contacted pest control company the middle of August 2022. -The pest control company said they were short staffed and could not come out until September 6, 2022. -When the bed bugs were first discovered by staff #3 she sprayed client #1's room with alcohol. Alcohol was supposed to kill bed bugs. -They also purchased bed bug foggers. They brought 15 of them and set them off in the facility while the clients were away. -About 3 or 4 days later they did a 2nd fog at the facility. -They were trying to figure out the source of the bed bugs at first. -They wanted to use a cheaper solution at first because bed bug treatment can be expensive. -A heat treatment for bed bugs cost over \$7000.00. The agency really can't afford that. -She confirmed the facility staff failed to maintain an insect free environment. 	V 738
